Class Schedule for the Week of February 26

Advanced HQ16 - "Laser Light/Pantographs" - Tuesday the 27th, 9-12 (Carol Monthei)

Quilting pre-designed patterns using the HQ16 laser light and pantographs. Prerequisite - HQ16 certification.

Intermediate Quilting Techniques - Wednesday the 28st, 9-12 (Sue Patch) (Second of two Wednesday sessions)

Y-seams, a nine-patch technique using squares, ways to change block dimensions,

several ways of finishing, including bindings. Samples will be made (materials furnished)

so please bring your basic sewing supplies (and a machine if you can).

This second session will deal with hands on practice and problem solving with instructor assistance.

The full class schedule is posted on the bulletin board. In general, the first day of each class will focus on the technique, the second class will attempt to provide some blocks to create a group quilt top.

From the Quality Control Committee... We have a few new solids in colors many of you have needed to finish the perfect quilt top. Now it can be done!

Let's use these solids for piecing and borders, NOT for quilt backs. This request comes from several advanced long arm quilters. They prefer prints or tone on tone for quilt backs, or white or muslin when using white / light thread.

When a back needs to be pieced please use the odd ball fabric towards the middle so the main back fabric is at the edges of the quilt. It makes a difference after the quilt is trimmed. Sometimes only a sliver of extra fabric remains. If that "sliver" fabric (of 6 or 8 inches) were inserted 14 inches or so from the edge, it could become the art look of the back.

Current responsibilities:

We propose the following additions/refinements:

1. Demos be scheduled every OTHER Monday providing more time for work stations activities

2. that the work station activities be scheduled by the Production Committee and the group at any station work on one project (e.g. a quilt or place mats)

3. Further, that work stations be project- oriented and learning techniques would be incidental, not the primary focus. If there are questions about techniques, someone from the education committee will be happy to assist the group. Learning techniques will continue to be the focus of classes.

4. Since there is a planned change of the depository of the class funds, that a separate line item be set up in the financial statement and that the Education Committee will determine how those funds (not needed by the teacher for student supplies) will be spent.

We feel that demos are a good way of:

- showcasing a technique (then the group might want to include it in a class or a workshop)
- creating an awareness of new products, books, magazines, web sites, etc.
- learning comparisons between products (battings, threads, etc.)
- expanding our creativity by showing how to integrate our donated fabrics into blocks e.g. nine patch, strings, log cabin, etc. that can be used for our charitable projects.
