## PROGRAM March 16

Audrey Young gave us a presentation on "spring cleaning" using strips, cutting all strips into same widths (usually 2.5" so could also be used for binding) putting them together and wrapping them jelly-roll style. She also had lots of other useful tips and it was decided Audrey should come back next season as a headliner.

Vel Peters showed her method of what she called "Flower Power". She uses Heat 'n Bond to bond two fabrics together, cuts her free-form flower shapes, sews a center – thereby making the petals 3 dimensional.

#### DOOR PRIZE

Vel Peters won the door prize as the person best able to explain W.C.T.U – the Women's Christian Temperance Union started in the 1870's in Illinois to counter alcoholism, and fight for women's right to vote. Frances Willard (my own initials was a hint) fought for these causes at that time. (There is a quilt block named W.C.T.U. – look it up.) Oldest continuous women's group.

Continuing the Block of the Month (BOM) for March is the Church Dash (plain and reconstructed). Instructions: Make two blocks of the pattern given: Save one as is. It makes a 12.5" block. Take the other one, cut in half (up and down and sideways NOT diagonal). Sew together to make an 11-3/4" block. This will make 2 quilts – one with 12.5" blocks and the other with the 11-3/4" block – it will come out a little smaller, but interesting and reconstructed.

#### FASHION SHOW AND TEA

Karen Anderson still has tickets for the Quilt-for-a-Cause Fashion Show and Tea on March 28th. Tickets are \$10. All the money goes to the above named charity which supports research of causes of breast cancer/gynecological cancers in women. This is a good cause, a great chocolate dessert, a fashion show and it's fun! Let's fill all these tables.

#### VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

#### From Beverly Polito:

Sewing Machine Applique

Materials Needed:

Pattern design – read carefully to see if pattern is reversed. If pattern is you will need to reverse design. Use a light Box or window or a glass tabletop with light under it to trace patterns onto fusible webbing. There are many patterns available through quilt shops or can find at <u>www.quilterswarehouse.com</u>.

Fusible Webbing – Used to trace pattern design. Pellon Wonder Under Lite"; Heat & Bond "Lite"; Steam a Seam Lite, Steam a Seam 2. Some fusible webbing come in "Heavy", this is used when you do not want to sew your design to a background. Heavy fusible will gum up your machine needle. Steam a Seam 2 is a double back stabilizer and can be moved around for placement.

Stabilizers – You always need a stabilizer it helps to minimize waviness and puckering in your design. Stabilizer is placed under the area you will be stitching and pin to hold design in place until you stitch at least one design. There are several different varieties of stabilizers available at Jo Ann Fabrics. (Sulky Cut Away; Sulky Tear Away; Sulky Wash Away; Sulky Brush Away)

Thread – I use Sulky Thread or Superior Threads. You can use a contrast thread or matching thread, depending on how you want your design to look.

Background Fabric - Always cut background block at least  $\frac{1}{2}$  to 1 larger than pattern calls for. Reason is it depend amount of stitching you will be doing on your design.

Equipment Needed:

Needles - I use Embroidery needles or Microtex Needle

Pins & Scissors & Iron – Always use a dry iron, follow manufacturers instruction on how long to hold iron on design usually 5 seconds. If design does not adhere repeat.

Pressing Cloth - a press cloth is important to prevent getting a shine on fabrics. Use either a plain sheet of paper to protect iron board cover in case fusible webbing comes in direct contact. If this happens use a new dryer sheet, run iron over it and webbing should come up. Also use on iron if webbing gets on it.

Sewing Machine – use a zigzag stitch, satin stitch or buttonhole stitch. Do a sample of stitches you are thinking of using. Mark the length and width that you want to use and keep as a guide for future use.

How to begin:

1. Trace pattern design to fusible webbing using a standard pencil. As you trace mark pattern pieces so you that you have exact order to place them on your background material.

2. Cut designs out and place on background. (Remember to remove paper before placing on background). I use pins to hold my pattern pieces in place until they are permanently press.

3. Press in place. I usually take the tip of iron and gently tap press around pattern pieces and remove pins gently. Than give the whole design a good press using the pressing cloth.

4. You can than begin to sew pattern pieces in place. Remember to put stabilizer under only the area that you will be sewing.

a. Before you zigzag stitch, stitch 5 or 6 straight stitches to lock threads in place.

b. After stitching, sew 5 or 6 straight stitches along edge to lock threads.

c. When turning corners, leave the needle down on the outside edge of design; raise the

Presser foot and pivot the fabric as needed. Lower the presser foot and resume stitching.

5. Remove stabilizer after you complete your sewing.

FYI: I would like to let other quilters to be aware that most fabric manufacturers on their website have free patterns available. Give it a try and I think you will be surprised! Some patterns are located under projects or quilt library. You will have to do a Google Search for web address. Manufacturers as follows:
